
Andrew Gulliford is a professor of history and Environmental Studies at Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado. He teaches courses on wilderness, national parks, Western history, and environmental history. He is the author of *America's Country Schools, Sacred Objects and Sacred Places: Preserving Tribal Traditions, and Boomtown Blues: Colorado Oil Shale*, which won the Colorado Book Award. He edited *Preserving Western History*, which was voted one of the best books on the Southwest by the Tucson-Pima County Library. His most recent book *Outdoors in the Southwest: An Adventure Anthology* won the 2014 Arizona/New Mexico Book Award in the category of nature/environment and the Colorado Book Award for best anthology.
